

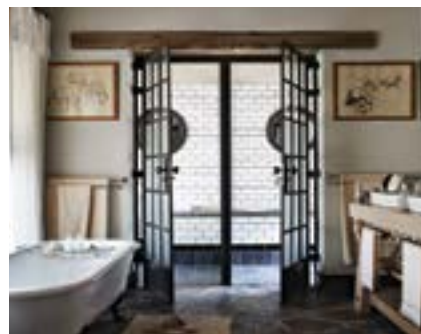


Home Game

JAMES FAWCETT BAILES, the grandfather of Singita owner Luke Bailes, established the Castleton estate in 1971 in a remote pocket of South Africa's Sabi Sand Private Game Reserve. In November, Luke's pioneering safari company opened the bush home as its third—and most exclusive—camp in the 45,000-acre park.

Following a renovation by the Cape Town-based design firm Cécile and Boyd's, Singita Castleton encompasses six garden cottages and a main house outfitted with botanical artwork, wooden writing desks, and deep verandas that overlook the savannah. Amenities at the main house include an open-air kitchen, a wine cellar, and a state-of-the-art fitness center. The exclusive-use estate, which hosts as many as 12 guests (prices start at about \$6,885 per night for eight guests), also features a spa-treatment room, a swimming pool, and a tennis court.

Guests at Singita Castleton can head out on private game drives for the opportunity to encounter Sabi Sand's leopards, lions, elephants, and other wildlife.
